
I invite you to join us in our work on behalf of birds.

### 2023 Mid-Atlantic Policy Priorities

This January, two new governors were inaugurated in Maryland and Pennsylvania. Their new administrations will bring change, but also continuity. We are happy to report that Pennsylvania Governor Josh Shapiro has nominated Cindy Adams Dunn to continue as Secretary of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR). Secretary Dunn has a long relationship with Audubon, serving as the executive director of Audubon Pennsylvania, and she has a strong conservation track record. Governor Shapiro has also nominated Rich Negrin to be Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection. Rich was Philadelphia's Managing Director under Mayor Michael Nutter.

In Maryland, Governor Wes Moore has nominated Josh Kurtz to serve as Secretary of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). An avid birder, Kurtz is a longtime partner with Audubon through his previous work with the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. We look forward to continuing to work

with him in his new position.

During the upcoming legislative sessions in Annapolis and Harrisburg, Audubon will promote policy approaches that address the growing challenges of climate change and its effect on the birds and people that call the Mid-Atlantic region home. In Maryland, we will focus on legislation to require bird-friendly design in publicly-funded buildings; expand conservation of habitats needed by threatened birds; incentivize renewable energy projects; and bolster the use of green infrastructure to help mitigate the impact of climate change.

In Pennsylvania, we will work with other environmental organizations to identify permanent revenue sources to sustain investments in state parks and public lands. And we will support funding for the Department of Environmental Protection's implementation of clean streams and water quality legislation. In addition, we will work to strengthen climate resiliency efforts in the state.

Audubon Mid-Atlantic looks forward to working in Harrisburg and Annapolis with public agencies, Audubon chapters, partner organizations, and elected officials to protect birds and the special places they need in the landscapes and habitats across the Mid-Atlantic. Throughout the year, we will invite you to join us in advocating for birds—through our united voices, we can make change happen.

#### 2023 I Bird I Vote Conservation Summit

We hope you will attend Maryland's annual I Bird I Vote Conservation Summit on Saturday, February 11th, 2023 from 9:00am until 4:00pm (but come earlier for a bird walk led by Audubon Mid-Atlantic's Dave Curson). We'll be meeting in person at the <a href="Chesapeake Bay Foundation">Chesapeake Bay Foundation</a> headquarters in Annapolis, MD.

Environmental advocates including Maryland Senator Sarah Elfreth, Maryland League of Conservation Voters' Political Director Kristen Harbeson, and National Audubon Society's Senior Director of Government Affairs Jesse Walls and Senior Director of the Migratory Bird Initiative Jill Deppe will speak on policy priorities that will address the impact that climate change and habitat loss have had on birds. Other speakers will include Audubon Mid-Atlantic staff, elected officials, and leaders of Maryland environmental organizations.

This event will provide an opportunity to learn how to advocate for Maryland's birds and the places they need to survive. <u>Registration is \$30 per person</u>, and will include coffee, snacks, lunch, and admission to all sessions.

## **Great Backyard Bird Count**

Audubon's 26th annual Great Backyard Bird Count will be held on Friday, February 17th through Monday, February 20th, 2023. This community science project provides Audubon and other leading ornithology groups with an annual snapshot of the state of birds across the world, as well as longitudinal data that shows trend lines over time.

You can participate in the count by simply observing birds in your own neighborhood and entering your observations onto eBird.
