

Exploring our connections with local birds

Last month, robins built a nest on our front porch and successfully hatched four eggs. In the days that followed, I found myself profoundly obsessed with the progress of these babies (perhaps because the event coincided with the graduation of my youngest child from college). I would sit quietly at a safe distance and observe their feedings through binoculars. I worried about many things: were the parents ignoring the smallest chick, was there enough room in the nest as the fledglings grew and would they all withstand the hard surfaces of our porch when they first left their safe home? I watched as their feathers came in and looked in awe when they began to stretch their bodies and spread their wings. When they left, I felt pride, joy and, yes, a touch of sorrow (did I mention my daughter's graduation?).

It's easy to understand how personally invested people can become in the birds that they see every day. But what about those species that we might never encounter?

One of our jobs at Audubon is help bird lovers find connections to birds that they may never see and places that they may never visit. One way we do this is through Audubon's <u>Migratory Bird Explorer</u>, which helps us easily understand the journeys

that our local birds take every year and then grasp why our conservation and policy work must focus on protecting the key habitats that birds need along those migratory paths.

It's encouraging to Audubon Mid-Atlantic staff when those connections are made—when center staff hear a child explain to her mom why clean watersheds matter to birds and people and when that mom joins more than 600 other Audubon supporters to reach out to ask PA state legislators to increase funding for water quality efforts.




Common Tern Nesting Platform

For three nesting seasons, Audubon Mid-Atlantic has worked with the Maryland Coastal Bays Program and Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to create artificial nesting platforms in Maryland's coastal bays for endangered colonial waterbirds. At this point in the nesting season last year, there were 19 nests on the island. Incredibly, this number has increased to 136 nests at the end of May for the 2023 season! We anticipate this number will continue to increase over the next month. View the graph below for a comparison of the past three years of the tern raft, and see how the number of nests has grown exponentially as nesting birds return to the platform year after year.

We hope this means that the numbers will continue to grow, and help to restore populations of Common Tern in Maryland which have declined by a staggering 90-95% since the mid-1980s due to sea level rise and the erosion of their natural barren sand nesting islands in the coastal bays. Pennsylvania Policy Roundup

Thank you to everyone who took part in our action alert advocating for increased Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and Department of Environmental Protection budgets in Pennsylvania. To date, there have been over 600 submissions to our action alert. There is <u>still time</u> to raise your voice on this issue!

In Pennsylvania, Audubon Mid-Atlantic is continuing to track legislation such as the Schools for Solar Act (HB1032), which will not only increase the availability of renewable energy for schools throughout the state, but will also protect birds and advance the future of Pennsylvania's renewable energy landscape. We're also watching the Balloon Release Litter Bill (HB1051), which would require that any balloons released cannot be made of nonbiodegradable material or inflated with a substance lighter than air, and that any violation will result in fines. We're also advocating that Pennsylvania remains a member of the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI). This would allow Pennsylvania to continue investing RGGI proceeds into renewable energy, habitat conservation, and green infrastructure throughout the state. This legislation directly impacts birds and the habitat they need to survive in Pennsylvania, and also helps us to advance our mission of reversing regional bird population declines across the Mid-Atlantic.



Baltimore Birding Weekend Was a Success!

The Baltimore Birding Weekend was a hit! Another nearly sold-out event took place in May, with guided tours taking place in and around Baltimore. Birders explored woods and streams, coastal landscapes, restoration sites, historical sites, and a paddle in the Patapsco River. Many saw their first Baltimore oriole in Baltimore! This year's event had the greatest number of tickets sold and the highest bird diversity counted in seven years of hosting this event – 149 species! Thanks again to our sponsors and participants for supporting Audubon's conservation efforts in Baltimore.
